Reception of Professor Nancy Wang Yuen's Presentation on Racism in Hollywood is Enthusiastic

On Monday, June 11, 2018, Professor Nancy Wang Yuen, Chair of Sociology Department, Biola University, gave a seminar in our monthly Lodge meeting. The title of the talk was "From Minstrelsy to Hellboy: Whitewashing of Asian Americans in Hollywood". Nancy Wang Yuen gave an informative overview of the history of whitewashing Asian characters in Hollywood, encompassing the silent film era to the present.

Many legendary actors such as Mickey Rooney and Katharine Hepburn played Asian parts. It was

interesting to learn how laws against mixed marriages in those days played a pivotal role in preventing Asian actors from appearing onscreen opposite white actors in romantic situations. Nancy also shared with us spotty track the

record of Asian actors and the Oscars. In the 89 years of the Academy Awards, only three actors of Asian descent have won acting Oscars and two white actors won their Oscars for playing Asian characters. In displacing Anna May Wong, Louise Rainer, a white actress, got to play the Chinese female lead and received the Academy Award for best actress for her role in Pearl Buck's movie, "The Good Earth" in 1938. Sadly, a repeated pattern of whitewashing still exists today. Recent examples Nancy discussed included Scarlett Johansson in "Ghost in the Shell", Emma Stone in "Aloha", Tilda Swinton in "Doctor Strange" and Ed Skrein in the new "Hellboy". There is some indication of change with Ed Skrein stepping down from the role after he learned his character was originally Japanese-American in the Hellboy comic books. This gave way to Daniel Dae Kim being cast. Social media has been an influential arena for raising whitewashing issues and to hold Hollywood accountable to its casting decisions. With more Asians participating in the film and TV industries, this situation hopefully will improve in the future.

Professor Yuen received her BS, MS, and PhD in Sociology, all from UCLA. She then began her teaching career in the Sociology Department of Biola University

She is the author of "Reel Inequality: Hollywood Actors and Racism", and co-author of "Tokens on the Small Screen: Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders in Prime Time and Streaming Television".
