Chinese American WWII Veterans and Families in Southern California are presented with Congressional Gold Medal Replicas

On November 13 and 14, C.A.C.A. in Southern California held the long-overdue ceremonies to present the Chinese American WWII veterans and their families with the Congressional Gold Medal (CGM) replicas. Two 2-hour sessions were scheduled on Saturday, Nov. 13 in the First Chinese Baptist Church of Los Angeles worship center located in Los Angeles Chinatown, where 153 WWII veteran families received the CGM replicas, and two veterans were awarded the Bronze Star Medal. The following day, Sunday Nov. 14, at the VFW Museum of Military

History in Simi Valley, saw 48 WWII veteran families receiving the CGM, and one veteran receiving the Bronze Star Medal in two sessions.

Presenting the Congressional Gold Medal replicas were retired Major Generals Robert G.F. Lee and Suzanne Vares-Lum (both from Hawaii), and retired Major General M. Ted Wong (from Orange County, CA). C.A.C.A. National President Melanie Chan drove all the way from Northern California to kickoff the ceremony in all 4 sessions, greeting the veterans and families, the Major Generals, and guests in attendance. In her opening speech, she gave a brief account of the history of the Chinese American WWII Veterans Recognition Project, headed by Past National President Ed Gor, in its campaign to get the Chinese American WWII Veterans Congressional Gold Medal Act passed in Congress and signed into law in December 2018. Sister Valerie Lee's father, William Wong, 97 years young and living, is a CGM recipient. He served with the 8th Army Area Command, in the Philippine Islands. He was assigned to ascertain the strength of the enemy and the number of Japanese in certain areas. One of his tasks was interrogation of prisoners, for which he made a daily report of all activities and gathered up Japanese soldiers after end of the war. He was a Staff Sergeant.

B. The Story of WWII Veteran Gim Hong Lee [Based on input from Gilbert and Valerie Lee]

A recipient of the CGM, Sister Valerie's father-inlaw, Gim Hong Lee, had an illustrious military service during WWII. Right after high school, at the age of 18, he volunteered for the Army Air Force in 1942 and flew with the 371st Bomber Squadron. Gim obtained the rank of Staff Sergeant



combat aerial photography. He flew reconnaissance and combat missions in a B-25 Bomber over the South Pacific during the war. He saw action in Borneo, the Philippines and New Guinea. His decorations and citations

included the Philippine Liberation Ribbon, World War II Victory Medal, American Campaign Medal, Asiatic Pacific Campaign Medal and Good Conduct Medal.

Like many war veterans, Gim seldom talked about his military experience in World War II. It was only after his passing that Gilbert learned about his father's many military accomplishments from his discharge papers.

Even though Gim never went to college, the military educated him, trained him and taught him discipline to succeed in life. Soon after the war, he went back to China, got married and returned to Gim worked for Douglas Aircraft in America. Long Beach. He specialized in the hydraulic

systems of fighter jet aircrafts for the Navy. During those early working years he planned and saved to start a business of his own. He finally accomplished that dream and opened the first Chinese American restaurant in the City of Downey

in the 1950's. The restaurant was called the Lotus Garden. The business was a success and he operated the restaurant with our family for 24 years, until he retired in 1981.

Gim was a devoted family man who also cared for his relatives and friends. He enjoyed all sorts of family activities such as family dinners, dim sum, the holidays and cooking special dinners for each member of the family on their birthdays. He loved the outdoors, especially fishing. In his retirement years he would go deep sea fishing and catch dozens of fish. He enjoyed sports such as football, bowling and horse racing. He would also attend USC football games with son Gilbert and really enjoyed the excitement of the game. He also enjoyed Monday night poker with his friends and buddies, and traveling to Las Vegas and Indian Casinos to try his luck. He was indeed a lucky guy.

According to Gilbert, Gim was always friendly with people and greeted everyone with a cheerful smile. As one family friend remarked about him, Gim had a zest for life and enjoyed every moment of it.

C. Southern California CGM Presentation **Ceremony was a Great Team Effort!**

Starting in Sept. 2021, a SoCal CGM Presentation Committee, led by the LA Lodge, was formed to prepare and coordinate the event. It consisted mainly of members from the LA Lodge and others from Southern California organizations. donations to the event, the most notable ones of which were from the UCLA-AASC and CIF Fund.

AAPI Studies Becomes Requirement for Public High- School Graduation in New Jersey

New Jersey is now the second state to require Asian American studies in its public schools after Governor Phil Murphy signed the measure into law on January 18, 2022. The bills, which state Senate and Assembly voted overwhelmingly for, allow local boards of education to pick instructional materials, but a proposed Commission on Asian American Heritage in the state Education Department may also assist in the process. The combined legislation will require the history and contributions of the Asian American and Pacific Islander communities be taught within the framework of the NJ Student Learning Standards for Social Studies.

New Jersey follows Illinois in requiring public schools to teach Asian American history after Illinois Gov. J.B. Pritzker signed the Teaching Equitable Asian American Community History Act in July 2021.

We note that these developments appear to be in line with what was advocated in the 2021 C.A.C.A. National Convention Resolution #1 "Advocating for Asian American Studies for K-12 Curricula", submitted by GSGV Lodge.
